Orienteers set to explore Beverley

ORIENTEERS will be exploring Beverley next weekend.

The second Humberside and Lincolnshire Orienteers' Beverley Urban Orienteering Event is being held in the town on Sunday, June 26.

The event will start and finish from the Market Cross in Saturday Market.

Competitors will be given a specially prepared map in-

dicating the control sites in and around Beverley town centre that they must visit in order to complete the course correctly.

Competitors can either take their time and enjoy the sites of Beverley while completing the course or try and finish in the fastest time in order to win.

Electronic timing and checking will be done to ensure the control sites have

been visited in the correct order- the electronic dibbers used are available to be hired on the day.

Anyone who fancies the challenge should turn up at the Market Cross between 10am and noon on Sunday June 26.

Beverley Urban Race proves a big hit

OVER 100 competitors turned out for the second running of the Beverley Urban Orienteering Race.

The event saw runners having to navigate their way through the streets and alleyways of Beverley at high speeds to try and take first place.

The race, organised by Humberside and Lincolnshire Orienteers (HALO), attracted

experienced orienteering experts from as far afield as Coventry, Middlesbrough and Manchester.

The event, which started and finished in the Market Square of Beverley, was won by Brian Ward, from South Cave, by a narrow margin.

Adam Bradbury of Rotherham was only one second behind him in second, with Beverley's England junior international Zac Field coming home third.

Another England junior, Charlotte Ward, followed in her father's footsteps by taking the women's open title by 12 minutes.

However, only two seconds separated second and third in this category. York's Amanda Cooper just pipping Emma Harrison from East Pennine Club.

Planner Neil Harvatt said, "It shows orienteering can be just as much a challenge in town centres as it is in the forests."
